It is with great pleasure that we announce that the **12th Day of Swiss Linguistics** will take place on **7 November 2022** at the **University of Lausanne**.

Organised every two years, the Days of Swiss Linguistics offer Swiss researchers the opportunity to **present their individual or group research projects**. All projects, even those that are not funded institutionally, can therefore be presented.

Rather than a traditional conference consisting of papers followed by in-depth discussion, the Days of Swiss Linguistics aim to offer a **relatively exhaustive collective overview of linguistic research conducted in Switzerland**. The main objective is therefore to increase the visibility of ongoing projects and to encourage the development of new synergies and collaborations. For junior scholars, the event is also an opportunity to develop their contacts and networks.

In order to guarantee the general principles stated above, the 2022 edition will be organised in the form of a series of **very short presentations** followed by **long breaks** during which the presenters will be available, **with or without additional poster(s)**, to answer any questions or make contacts. It is also possible to **participate by poster(s) only**.

The organising committee invites individuals and research groups interested in participating to send an abstract of maximum one page to **linguistique_suisse_2022@unil.ch** before **1 March 2022**. The document should contain the contact information and affiliations of all persons involved and indicate the type of preferred presentation: (i) a very short oral presentation, possibly accompanied by (an) additional poster(s); OR (ii) poster(s) only.

We look forward to welcoming you to Lausanne in November 2022.
